MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT: REFLECTIONS ON OUR TIMES

It came as a thief in the night. Its effects were gradual and went unrecognized by many until the erosion left gaping holes in the landscape of our profession. Technological innovation was the relentless rain that pummeled our discipline's currency and eroded the value of our product. Aggressive global competition was the gale wind that swept away much of our tradition of ethics, honesty and responsibility. In the end, however, it was complacency and greed that inflicted the deepest wounds and scarred our profession for years to come. And, we must not delude ourselves that the failures rest exclusively with the practicing profession. Too many academics, for far too long, were complacent: willing to excuse inaction with a litany of alleged justifications. We clung to arguments that curriculum innovation was unnecessary; that Albrecht and Sack, and a legion of others, were wrong! But, we refused to invest our time and efforts to know whether it was true or not. We steadfastly, as a group, refused to educate ourselves about the changing business landscape in which our students functioned and respond to it. We succumbed to the "Arrogance of Ignorance!" We dutifully prayed that everything "really" remained the same, and that the world would some day return to its senses and recognize the value of our "old ways". Others argued variously... that we were not being paid enough to undertake the Herculean innovations some proposed...that we needed more time for research...that the dean imposed other priorities...and a hundred other excuses why we didn't retrain and innovate. Of course, greed was there also. When the world was no longer prepared to pay handsomely for our out of date products, some of our former students sold the one thing left: their integrity, the real core value of the *PROFESSION*.

So what are we to do now? How are we going to right the ship? We are highly trained and highly intelligent people. Adapt. Survive. Thrive! The crisis in confidence that pervades our profession does not rest exclusively with the public's lack of confidence in us but with our own shallow confidence in ourselves. This is not the time for the academic accounting profession to wait for someone else to take the lead or for some savior to rise among us. The responsibility for our dilemma rests with all of us; and the solution rests with all of us. Each of us must step up. The time is past for more excuses for inaction. It is time to roll up our sleeves, recommit and get busy. Most of us chose the career of a faculty member to help students, to make a difference in their lives, and by so doing make a difference in society. When did that mission change? When did rankings, money and self-adulation become the goal? The seeds of our current problems lie not with what we have done, but with what many of us have not done.

The FSA must and will commit to facilitate efforts with renewed energy and vigor. Volunteer! The FSA is an open network. We do not need "a few good men and women;" the profession and the Federation needs lots of volunteers.

REPORT ON THE 2002 FSA 26TH ANNUAL MEETING

The 26th Annual Meeting of the FSA was held October 17 – 19 at the seaside Beau Rivage Resort in Biloxi, Mississippi. The meeting was deemed a great success by participants, who gave the 24 concurrent sessions and 2 plenary sessions **very high** marks. A common assessment was that the meeting was **“One of the best in recent years.”** Plenary speakers were Mr. John W. Bachmann, Managing Partner of Edward Jones, and Dr. Marianne Jennings, widely published business ethicist. Mr. Jones spoke on the topic of “Reforms in Accounting and the Financial Services Industry;” Dr. Jennings spoke on the topic of “Lessons from a Perfect Storm of Financial Reporting.” FSA’s strong ties with the AACSB was accented by three sessions related to accreditation issues: (1) The AACSB Experimental Review Process: Some Initial Experiences, (2) Accreditation Performance Metrics and (3) New Draft AACSB International Accounting Standards. A special invitation AACSB conference immediately followed adjournment of the annual meeting on Saturday afternoon. Similarly, the strong FSA-AICPA partnership was emphasized by three sessions devoted to new professional initiatives of the AICPA: (1) The AICPA Financial Analysis Project and Publicity Project, (2) The New AICPA Reporting Model Initiative, and (3) AICPA Professor/Practitioner Cases. Other concurrent sessions addressed curriculum developments in ethics, intro accounting, auditing and project management and the new SAP ACCT (Advancing Curriculum Change in Technology) Initiative. Finally, sessions devoted to internships, student recruiting and the new Uniform CPA exam rounded out a very full but flexible program.

FSA PRESENTS SERVICE AWARDS AT ANNUAL MEETING

The Federation of Schools of Accountancy annually gives two major awards to recognize exceptional service to the accounting profession. The Joseph A. Silvano Faculty Merit Award is given to an academic who has made notable contributions in teaching, curriculum development, service and research. The FSA Practitioner Award is given for distinguished service to accounting education and to accounting groups. The FSA presented these two awards during its 2002 Annual Meeting held in Biloxi, MS.

The first award was the Joseph A. Silvano/FSA Faculty Merit Award. This year's recipient is Frederick L. Neumann from the University of Illinois. Fred is the twentieth recipient of this FSA recognition. He has been very active in the FSA, having served in a number of capacities including Director and President, as well as chair of several major FSA committees. This award is generously co-sponsored by KPMG, which provides a check for \$2,500 to the recipient. The FSA congratulates Professor Fred Neumann as the recipient of this award and thanks him for all of his service to accounting education and to the FSA.

The second award was the FSA Practitioner Award. This year's recipient is John Hunnicutt from the AICPA. John is the fourteenth recipient of this FSA recognition. John has served on the FSA's Board of Directors for several terms, and has been a key source of support within the AICPA on behalf of the FSA. The AICPA now provides administrative services to the FSA. John recently retired from the AICPA after many years of efforts for accountancy and for accountancy education. The FSA congratulates John Hunnicutt as the recipient of this award and thanks him for his distinguished service to the profession of accounting and to accounting education.
